is being assembled in the coming school year at the state level, Nettle Creek School Corporation will initiate a standardized assessment plan that we've been working on for the past year that calls for the administra-



tion of NWEA in grades K-12 three times throughout the 2016-2017 school year to assure student learning is on track and growing for all students. Teachers will use NWEA results to de-NWEA termine the effectiveness of past instruction as well as to determine what students are ready to learn next focusing on the Indiana Academic Standards. NWEA results will also be shared

as they come in through the year with students and parents. In fact, NCSC students and parents are already familiar with NWEA (MAPS) tests because K-6 students have taken them here, for years. Eventually, the state will complete their work with a standardized testing program. In the mean time, the students and their teachers at NCSC are ahead of the curve and will lose no time receiving this important assessment information throughout the coming school year to assure all students are GROWING @ THE CREEK!

It's not unusual for students to write reports in school, in fact, the Indiana Academic Standards require it, and Ms. Doerstler framed the activity so that each student chose a part of the Nettle Creek community to research. Projects ranged from models of historic, family homes in the area to a video about Abbott's Candy Shop. The students took the project to the next level by each presenting their written work aloud to an assembly of their parents, grandparents and community members. Ms. Doerstler took the project even higher by arranging to hold these presentations in the evening, upstairs, at the Hagerstown Museum on East Main

Street. Picture student Brock Senese who learned about Philip Belt,

a Hagerstown resident who became internationally famous for crafting 46 Mozart-era pianos and who donated one of them to the Hagerstown Museum, making his presentation before a standing-room-only crowd. When Brock finished teaching us what he had learned about Mr. Belt, he pointed down from the stage and said, "And there is one of his pianos, right there!" The teachers and Mr. Childs continue to build a powerful learning opportunity for students at Hagerstown Junior/Senior High School. Working in partnership with two other rural Indiana high schools along with facilitators from North Carolina and the University of Indianapolis, Nettle Creek continues to initiate a grant-funded Early College program locally. This week,



the facilitators came to town to build capacity among school staff and to facilitate a meeting between school personnel and county-wide community leaders to identify regional assets, opportunities, and threats as our team continues their two-year building process. Their work is developing possibilities for our high school students to become college and career ready in new and different ways upon their graduation from high school. Folks from Wayne Bank, Ivy Tech Community College, Reid Health, Dot Foods, New Castle Career Center, Wayne County Economic Development Corporation, and Wayne County Health Department were among several other community representatives who worked with the Jr./Sr. high Leadership
