This is the rate that the IDOE tracks on their Compass website and describes the percent of students who earn diplomas. The second rate is the Non-Waivered Rate which is figured to include passing certain courses in a student's career, and the third is a rate that comes somewhere in between the Waivered Rate and the Non-Wavered Rate. Interestingly, the *Pal-Item* used the Waivered Rate in their article for Wayne County schools, and the *Courier-Times* used the third rate in its article describing the success of Henry

One cannot help but notice the changes that Mr. Hillman and his Environmental Services team have




he understands that as long as there are staff and students to serve, his job is never done.
