ISTEP+ Scores Are One Indicator!

The Indiana Department Of Education released schools' 2016-2017 ISTEP+ scores last week. The value of ISTEP+ has been called into question enough over the last several years that the state is due to replace it

eventually by a new standardized, state-wide exam. While it remains, however, we take ISTEP+ results seriously though with a grain of salt. This year's scores indicate that Nettle Creek's relative achievement rate among Wayne County school corporations remains consistent. We are proud of our academic standing, but fully recognize we need to keep our prime focus on our students' academic achievement and grow it. The actual percentages of students passing is quite variable between subjects in the corporation. Proficiency percentages are tops in science ranging between 80% and 90% of our students passing. The percentages of students proficient in reading range from 60% to 70%. Our math proficiency ranges from a low of 36% in Grade 3 to a high of 63% of students proficient in Grade 4. The variability in the range of scores between subjects can be explained. Science instruction is absolutely on track, and teachers are working hard to maintain exemplary instruction while working to help



more students each year reach success. ISTEP+ reading has tested vocabulary and comprehension for many years, and they test the state standards, so students and teachers are prepared for what students will see on the reading test. Math assessment which at one time focused on calculation has changed quite a bit, however. Now, ISTEP+ math tests reasoning which requires a level of sophistication that is being addressed here with different instructional strategies and materials in classrooms and time for students to learn this new way of math thinking. Teachers have selected new math materials and are receiving training that will help them teach to this area of need. We make no excuses. As Nettle Creek GROWS @ THE

CREEK to assure that all of our students meet this new challenge, teachers are using MAP test scores in both reading and math in Grades K-12 to determine where our students' levels of understanding are and what they are ready to learn next. MAP scores show we are making progress that will become evident in ISTEP+ scores or on the next state exam when it comes. If you have questions about your child's achievement, please contact your child's teacher. We recognize that our strong home & school partnership is essential for student success!

Walk Throughs Are Powerful Tools!

Principals are rising to the challenge of increasing student achievement in their building by visiting each classroom at least once per week to observe instruction and to provide actionable feedback to teachers. With two principals in each school building, each teacher can expect a short, unannounced walk-through visit twice per week. Teachers are very welcoming of these visits, and the opportunity for principals to actively see first-hand how instructional time is being used gives them the background necessary to carry on a productive, professional dialog with teachers that supports increasing student academic achievement.

School Personnel Are Always On Hand!

Keeping students safe in school is very important at Nettle Creek School Corporation. Teachers and administrators take an active role to assure student safety. Close student supervision is an important part of our




school safety plan. One procedure that is in place at both schools is especially useful when students are walking in the halls. In the morning at HES when students are coming to class, teachers greet students in the hall outside of their classrooms. This is a nice way to start the day for both students and teachers. Administrators stand at the school's front doors, and teachers at the Jr./Sr. high are outside their classroom doors, too, in the morning and during passing periods sharing smiles and trading friendly banter with students to assure students get where they need to go on time. The secret to our success though lies in the trustworthiness of our students them-

selves. Nettle Creek families begin teaching their children to respect others and plant the seeds of successful conflict resolution long before they arrive at school as Kindergartners. Some schools tout the number of cameras they have in their facilities. We have those cameras, too, but the best security we have includes active staff supervision and students who expect better of themselves.
